Northburn School Games Mark Success

School Games Mark is a national award to recognise and reward schools for their year-round commitment to PE, school sport, physical activity and the development of competition across their school. 2018-19 was another successful year for Northburn, as we achieved the prestigious **Platinum Award** for the first time.



To achieve the Gold Award a school needs to ensure that all children have 2 hours of timetabled PE, engage at least 50% of pupils in extra-curricular activities, have a year-round calendar of opportunities for appropriate competition, engage at least 15% of pupils in leadership activity, have active links with local community providers and support school staff in the delivery of school sport and physical activity.

Northburn Primary School is one of only four Cramlington and Seaton Valley schools who have achieved the **Platinum Award**. The Platinum level was launched to reward schools that have maintained consistently high standards with their school sport provision. To achieve the **Platinum Award** a school must have maintained the Gold Award for 5 consecutive years and demonstrate their school's achievements through a detailed case study. Congratulations to Northburn staff on the national recognition of their commitment to providing a wide range of opportunities to their pupils throughout the year.



Girls Football Tournament

KS2 girls have been training hard in preparation for the Y5/6 Cramlington and Seaton Valley football tournament, which took place in October. Both teams played fantastically and with great sportsmanship. Amazingly, Northburn yellow team won the tournament and will represent Cramlington and Seaton Valley at the Northumberland School Games in June 2020.



Improving standards and increasing opportunities in PE

Northburn staff have been working alongside specialist coaches in PE sessions, aiming to increase the range of opportunities available to pupils, whilst also improving their subject knowledge and confidence in some activities, to promote sustainability for the future. During the Autumn term, gymnastics, badminton and Pilates were introduced to classes across KS1 and KS2. Badminton is a sport that many pupils may not have had the opportunity to try before, yet is a great activity for getting active with family and friends. Pilates was new to many of the children, who discovered that it was hard work! As an individual activity where you are only competitive with yourself, and a chance to relax and be calm and mindful, this has engaged pupils in PE who might not always enjoy "traditional" PE activities.

Table Tennis

Pupils in KS2 have enjoyed learning to play table tennis at after school club. The club has been very popular and was set up as a result of a suggestion made in a pupil voice forum. Pupils that had never played before are now developing good basic skills under the tutelage of Harry, our coach.

Thunder in the Valley—Basketball Tournament

In November, teams from Northburn descended on the Newcastle Eagles Community Arena for the annual Thunder In The Valley basketball competition. Y5&6 pupils from Cramlington schools took part in a 4v4 basketball competition. The standard from both our teams was impressively high with a lot of competitive play and plenty of baskets scored. Almost 300 players, school staff and family supporters stayed and enjoyed the spectacle of live top-class basketball as they cheered Newcastle Eagles to a 104-71 victory over Manchester Giants.




Nursery
